Forest School Update

Class 1 have had quite a creative time in Forest School this half term. We started off doing some leaf threading which resulted in some beautiful necklaces being made. The following week we continued the leaf theme by each year group making a giant nest that they could all fit into, making much smaller nests for my needle-felted Little Robin to try out, and raking up huge leaf piles to jump into. The latter activity was a highlight for many as they stacked up some tyres to climb up onto a tree to enable them to dive into the leaf pile from a height! Enormous fun was had by us all. The week after that we made lots of pine cone bird feeders to hang in the woods and in week 4 we made Forest Friends - simple stick figures brought to life with leaves, fabric scraps, colourful yarn and drawn on faces. I cut some willow for us to make Christmas wreaths and the children pounced on the pile of yarn, fabric and ribbons to produce wreaths, dream catchers and other marvellous creations. We have played our favourite games Spot and Foxy Foxy, and have also enjoyed playing Sleeping Bear, Scatter and Funky Monkey; this last one is hilarious and really gets the brain working hard! In week 5 we cooked up a big Woodland Apple Crumble over the fire.

Although not to everyone's taste, the entire pot was devoured with some children having up to four helpings! I think everyone tried some, and I am always so proud of our more anxious eaters when they are willing to try new food in the forest, as it can take a lot of courage to do this. We finished off this week with a Christmas Chocolate Hunt around the woods and then we fired up the kelly kettle for a warming cup of hot chocolate.

Reception Class have played lots of games in the woods; the Name Game, Foxy Foxy Can We Cross Your Field, the Tree Game (to celebrate National Tree Week), Spot and Sleeping Bear. We have also had fun making self-portraits using natural materials, making a giant leaf nest for us all to sit in, and jumping and rolling about in the big leaf piles made by Class 1. We toasted marshmallows over the fire one week, and we all agreed they were delicious. We read the story In My Nest and made our own nests for Little Robin or Little Hedgehog. We also made pine cone bird feeders as a treat for our feathered friends and hung them from the trees and bushes. In National Tree Week we had an excellent discussion about the importance of trees, and we were so impressed by the children's knowledge. We ended the term with a very wet walk around the school grounds spotting lots of signs of winter and then we had a very exciting search for chocolate sprouts and chocolate Christmas puddings on the woods!
