<u>English</u>

Our key text is **"One Day on our Blue Planet ... in the Savannah."** We will be writing an information text about lions as well as two poems. One of which is descriptive and the other rhyming. Finally, we will be retelling the Nativity Story. Key Skills

Geography – Lets go to Kenya

In this unit the children will learn about where Kenya is located in the world and find Kenya on a world map or globe. They will draw a map of Kenya and locate the capital city, some main cities and oceans. They will learn to understand what some aspects of Kenyan life are like. They will begin to identify the features of a national park and begin to explain the difference to a game reserve. They will describe some differences and similarities between Kenya and the UK. They will begin to understand the importance of tourism to Kenya. The children will draw a freehand map of Kenya, a map of a national park and will begin to consider the location of key features. They will identify animals that live in Kenya and begin to explain the concept of 'endangered species'. When developing fieldwork skills, the children will confidently use compass directions to move around a map. They will also use an atlas/globe to locate accurately places and landmarks in Kenya.
